
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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Hi everyone,

It is hard to believe but we have reached the end of semester one, the middle of the school year and what a huge one it has been. This semester has possibly been the one with the biggest changes for our staff and students with the way we teach and learn, particularly when it comes to the way we teach reading and the English curriculum. As an example, we have introduced Instructional Routines for every class across the school when teaching phonics and spelling. An instructional phonics routine is a structured and systematic approach to teaching phonics skills in the classroom. Phonics is the method of teaching the relationship between sounds and their corresponding letters or letter patterns. It helps students develop decoding skills and improve their reading and spelling abilities. This approach also helps our students to look more deeply into the way words are formed, for example, through morphology. Morphology is the study of words, how they're formed and their relationship with other words in the same language. Morphology analysis the structure of words, such as stems, root words, prefixes, and suffixes, and parts of words.



The study of morphology supports us with our vocabulary development, spelling, reading and writing.

The routine has clear and predictable parts that include both new learning and revision of concepts already taught and builds on to the learning from the previous

We have been able to see that the instructional routines are helping student's learning through our new way of collecting, tracking and assessing student data. This data helps us to make sure that our students are on track with

their learning, need some extra support with particular aspects and to share their learning journey with staff, students and families.

Another benefit of teaching methods such as the instructional routine is that when there is a change of teacher, for example, through sickness, the guest teacher in the room can present the exact lesson content that would occur if the regular teacher was in the room. This has been of great benefit this year as all schools have been hard hit with sickness that has affected both school staff and the temporary relief teachers we have been trying to employ. In fact as I am writing this we have 9 staff absent from school and we are unable to find all of the temporary staff we need to replace everybody. Teachers, like any other professionals, fall sick or may have to attend to personal emergencies, such as family matters or medical appointments but we work hard to find replacement staff who know our school, our students and the way we go about teaching and learning.

Another great achievement for us has been continuing our journey of improving the functionality and look of our school. We started the year unveiling the new entrance to the school with a widened concrete pathway and new welcome signage. New aluminium doors replaced the old wooden sliding doors in the Red and Blue Units. This was followed by our wonderful metal art tree and bench for the veranda area, complemented by the relocation of the values pencils and the upgrade of the

garden areas and new trees. And as this newsletter is being distributed, the new air-conditioning is being commissioned and our Orange Unit is returning to the library and staff/ meeting room.

Special thanks need to go to a number of people for their donations, support and hard work.

Thank you to the Renshaw family for the donation of the metal art tree, Virginia nursery and Fitzy's Native Plants for helping to upgrade our gardens. To Matthew Oxford and his family for the donation of all the new trees around our grounds. To Karen Bentley and Travis Renshaw for the extra grounds and bobcat works that we have done.
